## DESIGN OF A WOMEN AND CHILDREN PROTECTION SHELTER WITH A HUMANISTIC ARCHITECTURE APPROACH

Women and children are vulnerable groups who often become victims of physical, psychological, and sexual violence. In Indonesia, the need for safe shelters that support psychological recovery is increasingly urgent as cases of violence rise each year. This final project proposes the design of a Women and Children Protection Shelter in Babakan Madang District, Bogor Regency, using a humanistic architectural approach that centers on the emotional and psychological needs of its occupants. The project is located on a 17,000 m² site, with a building area of 9,000 m² and 6,000 m² of outdoor space, including gardens and green open areas. The spatial design emphasizes flexibility of function, safety, comfort, and sustainability, including the use of family rooms as a substitute for individual bedrooms to accommodate women and children together. This study refers to LPSK regulations, SIMFONI-PPPA data, and global precedents for trauma-informed shelter design. The design aims to serve as a prototype for protective shelters that are not only physically secure but also foster holistic recovery and empowerment for the occupants.
